#### Definition

## **Prevalence of Use**

#### **Prevalence of Use**

- Half of 8<sup>th</sup> graders have viewed pornography
- 94% of men and 87% of women have seen it in their lifetime.
- Among users of Amazon.com, 92% of men and 60% of women viewed some form of pornography in the previous month



• During the Covid-19 pandemic, pornography use increased by 11%.

# Just One of Millions of Porn Sites

- 42 Billion visitors accessed pornography in 2019.
- Daily visits to the site now exceed 100 million.
- The site logs 962 searches a second.
- Every minute 63,992 new visitors access its content.
- 168 years to watch all videos uploaded in one year.



#### **Child Sexual Abuse Pictures**

- 20% of the profits to the pornography industry.
- 21% of male porn users view child porn.
- Users are more sexually interested in children than adults.

## Why so much child porn?

- Demand increasing with childification of mainstream pornography.
- 18 year olds who look 14.
- For some, adult porn leads to child porn use.

 Interest in pornography featuring teens (above and below the age of consent) has significantly increased (Walker, Makin, & Morczek, 2016).






# Violent Content = The New Mainstream

  - Slapping
  - Hair Pulling
  - Choking

# Female Performers Reactions in Online Porn

- Express pleasure during forced vaginal or anal penetration, and forced gagging; particularly if the performer is a teenager.
- Teaches viewers that women enjoy aggressive and demeaning sexual behaviors
- Though the female actor may speak words of enjoyment, the facial expressions, tears, and positions make the woman out to be pained, prostituted, and humiliated. Furthermore, the language used by pornography users encourages the denigration of women.

## **Internet Clips**

- 45% show at least one man "finishing" on woman's face.
- 72% of men and 46% of women have seen pornography where a man ejaculated on a woman's face

# **Imitating Violence in Pornography**

- Pornography showing rape has been seen by 21% of men and 11% of women.
- BDSM porn has been seen by 45% of men and 33% of women.
- 20% of men and 12% of women have chocked someone during sex, 11% of men and 21% of women have been chocked during sex, and 48% of men have ejaculated on a woman's face.
- Among those who have seen "rough sex" in pornography (behaviors including hair pulling, spanking, scratching, biting, bondage, fisting, and double penetration) 91% wanted to take part in such behaviors and 82% had taken part in at least one of the behaviors.

# Watching Pornography In Some Cases Leads to...

- Sexual violence
- Risky sexual behaviors such as multiple partners and unprotected sex

#### **Porn to Sexual Violence Connection**

 Viewers develop sexual scripts that involve coercion and then seek to act them out in real life

## **Porn/Sexual Violence Connection**

- When the pornography is especially violent
- When the user has peer support for sexual violence
- When the user is <u>hypermasculine</u> and emphasizes <u>impersonal sex</u>



# Men's Consumption of Pornography

- Impacts their views of women
  - Objectification
  - acceptance of sexual mistreatment of women
  - making unwanted sexual advances toward women

More likely to have been sexually assaulted

#### **Effects on Women**

Pornography use in women =

Greater acceptance of sexual victimization.

## **Porn and Rape**

• With increasingly high use of porn, it becomes more likely that men will be likely to rape, likely to commit sexual assault, be sexually entitled, and have hostility toward women (Goodson, et al., 2020).

 Men who consume more pornography, particularly male-dominant pornography, are more likely to use sexual force in their own relationships

(De Heer et al., 2020).

# **Effects on Relationships**

- Less satisfaction in relationships
- Less close relationships
- More loneliness
- More depression

### **Does Pornography Make You Lonely?**

- 1,247 people surveyed
- More pornography = more lonely.
- Loneliness influenced porn use,
  - porn use influenced loneliness
- Because sex is a relational activity and porn use isolates a person, people become more lonely.

## Marriage

- Men who have high levels of pornography use are less likely to get married
- Married people who view pornography
  - More likely to believe that their marriage is in trouble
  - More likely to discuss ending the marriage
  - More likely to repeatedly break up
  - Less likely to view their relationship as good or strong
  - Less likely to feel like a team with their spouse
  - Less likely to think their relationship makes them happy
  - Less likely to believe their relationship is nearly perfect
  - Less satisfied with their marriage


#### **Married Men**


# **Brain Development**



- Motivates you
- More = makes you want
- Most dopamine orgasm
- Glue binds nerves assuring repeated behavior.

#### **Youth and Adolescents**

- The impact of seeing pornography on a young person with a developing brain can be even more impactful than what is seen by an adult.
- An adolescent brain has not yet fully matured, particularly in the control center for suppressing of anti-social sexual behaviors they see in pornography.
- Thus, adolescents may be particularly vulnerable to the impact of violent pornography and are at particular risk for acting on what they see.

## Yes, Pornography Can Be Addictive


In a study looking at brain scans of males, neurologists found that the brain activity among heavy porn users showed a behavioral addiction, much like substance and gambling addiction.

## **Analyzing Men's Brain Scans**


- All men who were tested liked pornography
- Addicted men felt like they had to have it.
- Men who were addicted to pornography had first seen porn much earlier in their lives than did the healthy men.

## Rerouting Roadways: Neuroplasticity

- The maps that nerve cells travel through the brain become re-routed as people use more and more pornography.
- "Nerve cells that fire together, wire together"

## **Addiction to Pornography**


• Their maps for normal sexuality are rewired and reinforced by pornography to prefer more explicit, graphic images in order to maintain arousal.

## With More Hours Per Week Using Porn...


 The less gray matter volume they have in their brain and less connective tissues associated with healthy brain functioning.

#### If Addicted

 Pornography addiction impairs recent verbal memory.



# Resisting small short-term rewards for larger, later rewards.

More porn use = less able to resist short term rewards



 Abstaining from porn for even 3 weeks helps people work toward long-term goals.

# **Religious Impacts**

# The more frequently young people view pornography...

- The less frequently they attend religious services
- The less important their faith is to them
- The less frequently they pray and feel close to God
- The more religious doubts they have
- They become less religious over time
- This is a spiritual battle!
- (Alexandraki et al., 2018).



## Men Who View Porn Frequently

- Less committed to their religion.
- Less likely they are to hold a leadership position in their congregation during the following 6 years

# Adolescents who are more attached to religious leaders

Have lower levels of pornography consumption

## **Among Adolescents...**

- Pornography use increases with age, especially with boys.
- Adolescents who attend religious services frequently are less likely to view pornography

## **Sexual Impacts**

## Sexting/Self Esteem

- Sexting is increasingly common among people age 18-29. In that age group, 38% of sent sext messages and 42% have received them. 15% of people have had their sext messages forwarded without their permission (Mori et al., 2020).
- Men with low self esteem are especially likely to use pornography as a way to over-conform to male norms like having emotional control and being self-reliant (Borgogna et al., 2020).

## Result in Addicted Men: Erectile Dysfunction (ED)

- Can't obtain/maintain erection
- 60% can't with partner
- No trouble with porn

## **Effects of Porn Scripts on Men**

- More porn use <u>during</u> sex
- Request porn sex acts of a partner
- Conjure images of pornography during sex
- Concerned about his performance and body
- Enjoys sex less with a partner

#### **Condom Use**

• When adolescents are exposed to pornography, they are less likely to condoms if they engage in sexual intercourse. However, if these adolescents had conversations with their parents about the importance of wearing condoms, the "pornography effect" went away (Wright et al., 2020).


## Race and Pornography

- In a study of mainstream pornography and aggression, black women were more often the target of aggression than white women (Fritz et al, 2020).
- Black men are more often portrayed as the perpetrators of aggression against women and are depicted as significantly less intimate with their partners compared to white men (Fritz et al., 2020).

• The most aggression in porn scenes occurs between black couples (Fritz et al., 2020).

## **Regular Pornography Users**

- Lower levels of satisfaction with their sexual performance
- Questions about their virility
- Lower levels of self-esteem
- More body-image issues

## **Eating Disorders**

 Women whose partners use pornography are more likely to have eating disorders

## Tommy's Story

 "I think the youngest I've seen would probably be 15 or 14; mainly the female. It's mainly like an older adult, like a homemade video with a younger girl. ... Usually the guy is like 18 but not much older. It's always a girl who doesn't really know what to do, so the male just kind of takes over and controls the whole thing. ... It's almost like abuse."

## **Practical Advice**

## **Hope After Pornography**

- Reducing use increases commitment to a romantic partner
- The more someone is committed to their faith, reads the Bible, attends church, the less they view porn

- 1.In the past, what have you done when a friend of yours handed you a smart phone and it had pictures of people who didn't have clothes on?
- 2. How did looking at the pictures make you feel inside?
- 3. Were any of the images you've seen in pornography violent?
- 4. What do you think the makers of pornography want you to think when they show violent content in their video clips?

## Questions to Stimulate Conversation (2)

- 1. What are some of the ways that watching pornography can affect the brain?
- 2. When brain scans are taken of men watching pornography, the parts of the brain that light up are those that deal with objects, not people. What do you think the implications of this is for people who look at pornography?
- 3. In what ways does pornography "retrain" the brain?

## Questions to Stimulate Conversation (3)

- 1. In what ways do you think the pornography you have seen has set expectations for you on what sex is like?
- 2. What are your thoughts about one day having sex with someone who has used a lot of violent pornography?
- 3. What kinds of behaviors can lead to the transmission of an STI? How does what is shown in pornography relate to that?
- 4. What kind of sexual violence is depicted in some pornography? What affect might this have on the viewer?
